Which local priorities will this work support?	Reducing repeat victimization rates for hate crime and increasing confidence in the police and local authority to deal with crime and antisocial behaviour.	

PROJECT DETAILS	<p>Proposed budget £8000.00 to develop a targeted piece of work to deal with hate crime in the borough. Through the strategic assessment, and other data gathered by local housing organisations, the Partnership has identified a potential underlying issue with hate crime in the borough. Recorded hate crime figures are low (with an improving sanction detection rate), but some of those offences are worryingly serious. Data gathered by housing organisations suggests that there are a number of lower level incidents occurring that are not being reported to the authorities, which have an impact on people’s lives and confidence in the authorities and have the potential to lead to more serious incidents if not effectively managed at an early stage.</p> <p>This work will support development of our understanding of what is happening in the borough, which is experiencing significant changes in population diversity at this time. It will also add value to our work with victims of hate crime, by encouraging increased reporting and improving community confidence.</p> <p>This borough is experiencing extreme budget pressures and would not otherwise be able to conduct this piece of work, which would reduce the partnership’s ability to protect communities from harm, to educate would-be perpetrators and to develop community confidence.</p>

Outcomes (what will have been achieved by the end of the project):	<p>Local communities will feel more confident to report hate crime incidents; lower level incidents will be identified and dealt with at an earlier stage resulting in a reduction in the number of more serious hate crime offences.</p> <p>Hate crime hotspots will be identified and targeted education campaigns will be delivered to help prevent future incidents.</p>	

Milestones and Key Deliverables:

Milestone 1 Qtr April to June

- Develop publicity campaign to promote Hate crime hotline and increase confidence to report
- Publicise to targeted communities
- Establish baseline of unrecorded incidents and levels of repeat victimisation through focus groups on housing estate
- Establish baseline of focus groups' confidence in police/local authority

Milestone 2 Qtr July to September

- Monitor level of unrecorded incidents and monitor focus groups' views on reporting hate crimes to police/authorities
- Monitor level and seriousness of recorded incidents
- Monitor focus groups' confidence in police/local authority
- Develop mediation support package for housing officers to use in resolution of local incidents

Milestone 3 Qtr October to December

- Continue to monitor level of unrecorded incidents and monitor focus groups' views on reporting hate crimes to police/authorities
- Monitor use of mediation support package and the impact on repeat incidents
- Monitor focus groups' confidence in police/local authority
- Continue to monitor repeat victimisation rates amongst housing tenants

- Monitor level of unrecorded incidents and monitor focus groups' views on reporting hate crimes to police/authorities
