POCA funded projects

Each year for the last three years SLF has received £500,000 from ARIS funding to fund community based projects aimed at reducing acquisitive crime and sending the message across London that crime does not pay. When funding is given to charities for distribution, the Charity Commission recommends between 10-15% is deducted for central costs. The figure of 15% was agreed by Assistant Commissioner John Yates in his letter dated 2 April 2008.

The projects listed below are all those which were funded in the financial year 2009 – 10 from the ARIS funding given in June 2009.

Aspire	£40,000	Aspire was created to mentor serving prisoners and ex-offenders from London and support them into sustainable training or employment. Initially funded for three years by KPMG, Aspire has been operating now for just over three years, and by directly addressing this important factor in the cycle of re- offending is working to make London a safer place.
