

- West Yorkshire







Reducing Crime Individual peer force performance










Footnotes:

*Due to the extension of the National Crime Recording Standard (NCRS) to all forces in April 2002, some of the change in recorded crime rates may be as a result of differences in recording practices, rather than an actual change in crime level. For the Metropolitan Police, the reductions in burglary and robbery rates are likely to have been slightly understated as a result of changes in recording practice. (It is difficult to estimate the NCRS impact on vehicle crime for this force.) See page 8 for more details and references to the Home Office report on the NCRS effect for each force. Note that this NCRS effect also impacts on the change in detection rate and in the percentage of offences brought to justice between 2001/02 and 2002/03 because both of these measures are based partly on the level of recorded crime.

Please note that although a comparison with 'most similar forces' has been made for the Metropolitan Police, this force can be considered less similar to these peer forces than other forces are to their most similar force group. This is because of the unique characteristics of the London Metropolitan area. Please bear this in mind when drawing conclusions from the comparative information for this force.
