Inspections in London who's looking at what?



There are currently a range of HMIC and HMIP inspections: inspections taking place across the country by various agencies, looking at police services, custody facilities and now police authorities.

Internal MPS inspections:

In London the Custody Directorate is nearing the end of a programme of internal custody inspections across all MPS custody suites. The inspections have a standard structure based on the criteria used by Her Majesty's Inspectorate of Constabulary (HMIC) and their work in partnership with HM Inspectorate of Prisons (HMIP).

They are designed to examine key issues that have been identified across a number of custody suites, and reports comment solely on the effectiveness of performance in relation to those issues. HMIC/P inspections of police custody form a key part of the joint work programme of the criminal justice inspectorates, agreed by ministers. They also contribute to the United Kingdom's compliance with its international obligation to ensure regular and independent inspection of all places of detention under the UN's Optional Protocol to the Convention Against Torture (OPCAT).

In London seven inspections have taken place to date. They have looked at borough strategies, treatment and conditions, individual rights and healthcare within the custody suite.

HMIC/P inspections have been taking place across the country since 2008.

to have regard to the views of the public in the execution of their functions. It also invites HMIC to inspect and report to the Home Secretary in relation to this new requirement.

Powers to inspect authorities already exist through the Local Government Act 1999 and the Police Act 1996.

As inspectorates, HMIC and the Audit Commission, along with the Wales Audit Office, have worked together and in partnership with the Home Office, the Association of Police Authorities, the National Policing Improvement Agency and Improvement and the Development Agency, to agree the inspection framework.

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Met Forward - What does this mean for the ICV scheme?



MPA Chief Executive Catherine Crawford explains the changes taking place across the Authority and how the organisation's working practices must move with them.

"Met Forward is a three year strategy to guide the MPS in tackling the issues that matter most to Londoners.

"I am sure you will agree

it is vital we focus our resources in the most cost effective and targeted manner possible, more so than ever in the current economic climate.

"In order that the MPA has the necessary capacity and capability to deliver Met Forward, it is important that we have the right people with the right skills and competencies, configured in the best way possible. Consequently, changes are now being made to the internal organisation of the MPA. These changes will affect the way we work and the people who carry out the work of the Authority.

"The MPA has set itself the target of I January 2010

to implement these changes and so from the beginning of 2010 changes should be in place across the MPA.

"In regards to the ICV scheme, the team size will reduce from nine to six, with the removal of three Coordinator posts, thus the way in which the team supports volunteers will ultimately have to change as well.

"I will be attending your next Chairs meeting in November in order to explain in more detail the changes to the MPA. I hope to be able to answer your questions and discuss the impact the changes will have on the ICV scheme.

"The ICV team, in conjunction with senior management, are working on new ways of service delivery, and these changes will be shared at the Chairs meeting in November and with all ICVs before the end of the year.

"The restructuring of the MPA gives us all a clear framework for future work and a focus to deliver what Londoners want. I hope that the changes to our delivery of the ICV Scheme will ultimately be a positive step towards a more efficient and robust service for London."

Handbook delay

You will recall that the ICV scheme handbook was due for review this year and the team has been working on some changes and updates since the Spring.

By late summer this year most of the changes and additions had been finalised. However, the proposed restructure of the MPA has delayed implementation of the revised handbook and policies because it was acknowledged that further changes may be required.

The documents will now be reviewed again to ensure the processes we describe, and roles involved, work with the new team structure and its resources.

It is hoped that once all changes and adaptations are made we can launch the revised version in the New Year.

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
